Do you know which Asian island is shared by three countries? Noah Lockey, a current CVCS student does. In fact, that was the winning question that gave him the title of state geography bee winner! In May, Noah will be representing the state of Idaho in the National Geography Bee in Washington, D.C. After winning our school's geography bee, Noah had to pass a qualifying test to move on to the state competition. In total, there were 2.5 million students that participated in the National Geography Bee this year.

At the state competition, there were 69 fourth–eighth grade students competing. Noah received a \$1,000 prize, a medal and an all-expense paid trip to Washington, D.C. to participate in the National Geography Bee competition. The national









competition is a four-day event consisting of 54 state champ participants (including DC and some of the US territories). When asked what advice he would have for those who want to learn more about geography, Noah said: "Go to places. Study places. Find new places on the map." Studying places on a map is how he knew the answer to the winning question which is: Borneo! CVCS is committed to continuing to strive to provide opportunities for each student to succeed and find their individual areas of giftedness so they can be used by the Lord to impact His kingdom. Springtime means the race to the school year's end is almost complete and activities are abundant on the Secondary Campus. Our Bible department just hosted this year's two-day Bible conference entitled "He Is Worthy." Our students left their backpacks at home and learned from great outside keynote and breakout presenters on topics such as God Is Worthy of Our Creativity, Our Work, and Our Families. Keynote speakers included Nick Duffel, Dr. Derek Voorhees, and Wendy Atkinson. There were also fantastic breakout sessions on topics surrounding creativity and work. We wrapped things up with an all-school BBQ which led into our Secondary Campus Spring Olympics.

Our departments are maximizing every minute and students are excelling in incredible ways:

- Our ninth grade Early American History classes saw our historical roots on their trip to Washington, D.C.
- The English department showed their versatility by using March Madness brackets to engage all students while incorporating best practice. English students made teams and harnessed their skills in grammar, reading, writing and silly human tricks to earn points for their teams.





- The Biblical Leadership class built benches and standing planter boxes. Then, the class delivered the benches and planters to neighbors around the school, along with notes of encouragement, in an effort to create something beautiful in order to love and bless others in the name of Jesus.
- Students are using their science and math skills to compete this spring in robotics competitions. We have a student on a team representing Idaho and the US at the FIRST Championship in Houston this spring. Another two students programmed and built a robot that competed and advanced to the Bowl-Bot competition in Arizona. Our Advanced Robotics class competed as a rookie team and placed 7th out of 31 teams in their qualifying round. Robots, experiments and even dissections (the approved kind) are happening all over campus.
- We have many students who competed in the Business Professionals of America (BPA) regional competition in the following areas: advanced accounting, legal office procedures, java programming, SQL database, small business management, desktop publishing, and PC troubleshooting. Two of our students qualified to compete at the national competition!

God continues to transform hearts and minds by His redeeming love, grace and mercy – all for His glory! We are grateful for His redemptive work and His transformation of our students – they are His workmanship!

According to the National Association for Gifted Students, AIG students are "those who demonstrate outstanding levels of aptitude (defined as exceptional ability to reason and learn) or competence (documented performance or achievement in top 10% or rarer) in one or more domains." AIG students need appropriate differentiation to help them reach their fullest potential. They

do not simply need more work; they need different learning experiences. In an effort to expand our differentiated learning opportunities for these students, we will be offering AIG language arts and math classes for 5th-8th grade students. They will be taught by teachers who are passionate about specifically meeting the needs of AIG students and who have been trained and credentialed in using best practices. If the world were perfect and we all received our happy ending here, there would be no need for Christ. However, the world is fallen and was broken by man. Because of God's unfathomable grace, those who receive Him will live out the happiest ending there ever could be. We receive the promise of salvation and eternity with the Lord.


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CVCS PURPOSE
